As Hurricane Irma nears Florida, Free Methodists are praying for protection for the residents of the affected areas and giving through the Bishops' Crisis Response Fund to support relief efforts.

Free Methodist <u>Southeast Region</u> Superintendent Darrel Riley, many of our pastors and church members are right in the middle of Irma's projected path. While some have been able to leave, others are volunteers at shelters and everyone is on high alert, preparing for the worst and praying for the best. Riley writes, "Once Irma makes mainland landfall, we ask for continuous prayer for both coasts and 'up the middle' of Florida. We will keep everyone informed as to aftermath opportunities for tangible help with work teams, etc. For now, prayers for our congregations, government and health officials, and first responders are most needed." As the winds begin to beat around those who are in Florida, please join us in prayer for their physical and spiritual safety. The God who redeems will redeem, even in middle of the storm's violence. Pray as though you were there.

Free Methodists in Haiti are thanking God that although Hurricane Irma caused damage in some areas, the hurricane was not as devastating as they feared it would be. Haitian Free Methodist Bishop Eliodor Desvariste reported, "We are OK. Only in the north we have damages. Some members' houses' roofs are gone, not church or school buildings. Some farms are devastated. As far as we know now, our pastors, families, students and teachers are OK. Our school directors are preparing to feed the kids. Please continue to pray for us."

In the last available report from the Grace & Peace Wesleyan Free Methodist Church in Nassau, Bahamas, Pastor Leonard Roberts said the church is "hunkered down" awaiting Irma. "We do not expect a direct hit, but there will be damage. We just completed repairs from Hurricane Matthew (2016) damage." According to news reports Saturday morning, the damage in the Bahamas was not as extensive as originally predicted.

The Free Methodist Church will mobilize and use its resources to assist where most needed in response to Irma. If you'd like to contribute even now, please do so through the Bishops' Crisis Response Fund at *fincusa.org/bfund*. Don't forget to continue to pray for and support people affected by the recent <u>Hurricane Harvey</u>.

The Bishops' Crisis Response Fund is the first line of rapid response to aid Free Methodists affected by natural disasters, famine and persecution. It is a means for the U.S. church to provide immediate, focused assistance through our church's local, international and missions infrastructure.



Listening to the news these past few weeks, our kids have learned more about hurricanes, destructive forces of nature, and various ministry opportunities to help the victims of these than I can ever remember learning at their age. Looking at these natural disasters happening – hurricanes, earthquakes, fires, floods – the question of "Where is God?" has come about. How would you answer that question?

Sixteen years ago on September 11th, Heather and I lived in San Jose, California – she was the new kindergarten teacher at the Christian school at the church where I was the new College Pastor. I was to meet all the Bay Area Pastors that day, my first official meeting as a pastor – and our church was hosting it. However, we both woke up to the news that planes had hit the World Trade Center in NYC – and from that time on, nothing was the same. I watched in our conference room of our church as both towers collapsed, and watched as parent after parent picked up their kids in total panic. By the time that next Sunday came around, our church had grown about 50-60% with people who were "coming back to Jesus". Many, however, were asking, "Where is God during this time? Is God judging us? Is it the end of the world?

These last few weeks have reminded me of that overwhelming feeling, that helpless feeling – due to the devastation of two major hurricanes (3 if you count Katia (Mexico)), a major earthquake, and the forest fires in the Northwest U.S. Throughout social media, people have responded with questions that range from the attitude of where is God to the attitude and opinion that the U.S. is being judged for their sins – hence the harsh weather and destruction.

I found an article on Churchleaders.com that discusses and explores three ideas that God might be teaching us, and leading us, through tragedy. These three ideas are not only great in that they help us look at what God is teaching us in the present time, but also to help us examine past tragedies and what we can learn from them as well.

Tragedy reminds us of life's brevity. "We may be strong and successful, and assume life is always going to be that way—but when disaster strikes, we realize this isn't true," Graham writes. "We can lose everything in only a few seconds, and perhaps for the first time we are brought face to face with the reality of death—and our need of God." Tragedy brings us to a humble recognition that having control over life is an illusion, and we are desperately in need of the God who holds the world together.

Tragedy reconnects us to community. "Disasters also can remind us of our need to help others, and not just be concerned about ourselves and our problems," Graham writes. "The Bible says, 'Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ' (Galatians 6:2)." So often tragedy breeds isolation. But one of the greatest gifts of Christian community is to be gently pulled out of isolation and into a loving group of people who weep and pray and can say "me too" in the middle of pain.

Tragedy reveals God's love. This is the message of the book of Job or the story of Lazarus' resurrection: tragedy happens, and it deserves to be mourned over (Jesus weeping at his friend's tomb models this). The beauty of the gospel is not that tragedies aren't tragic, it's that—to paraphrase the poet John Donne—one day death will die. The hope is that even the most terrible tragedies can be weaved into God's beautiful story of redemption.
