Interview with Superintendent Tom Doherty

Is this job more than you expected?

"No. The job is all that I hoped for and more."

How is it more than you hoped for?

"There are a lot of opportunities with the vision that we have, to get involved with helping churches get healthy, planting new churches, and connecting with the lives of people who are building the kingdom of God. And that is what I love to do!"

Is it taking up more energy than you expected?

"My investment of time is considerably more than sixteen hours a week; it's more like 30 plus hours. When there are critical issues it can balloon to 40 or 50 hours a week. The time is not the only factor. The weight of the situations that you are involved with can be taxing as well. When we are working through churches that have pastors that leave and take 2/3 of the congregation with them, or working with people whose lives are broken by sin there is a heavy emotional investment."

What do you like most about being superintendent?

"First, I love the opportunity to express the vision that God has laid on my heart and work with people to see it accomplished. The vision quite simply is to enhance the connections throughout the conference; to provide leadership development opportunities to local leaders and pastors; to vitalize all of our churches, and to start a church planting movement in Michigan. To that end working with people and seeing those things start to be accomplished, and to see God being given the glory, is exciting.

We have met with some of our churches who have requested a meeting with the vitalization team and we have already heard of improvements of attendance and finances from some of these churches. Our church plant in Mecosta has grown to an attendance of 44 last Sunday, in the mid-teens on Wednesday night. In addition they have seen spiritual breakthroughs in some of the new families they have brought in. A couple that have been living together for the last 15 years has asked Pastor Howard to marry them. They have significant connections with young people in the community. The community has put together a fundraiser in which they have named the Mecosta Free Methodist Church as the place that they want to give the money. The church is finding families in the community who are hurting, to bless them in the name of Jesus. These are just a couple of examples of what God is doing as we follow His vision for the conference."

Does the success that we've had so far seem to be energizing the vision, and creating a momentum toward more church plants?

"Good question! It is energizing the superintendent, and I am looking for more partners all over the conference that would like to be involved in church planting! While the denomination is encouraging us to plant in large cities, and I want to do that, it seems for us in North Michigan that we have an abundance of smaller towns with individual personalities and needs; which need free Methodist churches in them."



Interview Cont'd

What unexpected joys have you experienced?

"A part of what God laid on my heart before I became superintendent was to look to the fringes, because he was calling people back into the mainstream of ministry. And there have been a number of pastors and lay people who I have connected with and God has vitalized. They have a joy for ministry once again. And that . . . that is just exciting to me." (smiles)

What unexpected strains have you experienced?

"Probably the part of the job that I was most unfamiliar with has to do with all of the denominational demands on the superintendent. The superintendent represents the conference to the denomination and there are several meetings that you have an opportunity to be apart of, but the superintendent also has to have a level of expertise in the areas of pension, insurance, workman's comp and a whole host of areas that people have questions about. Although I can delegate a lot of this, I still need to have sufficient understanding of the issues to know who to delegate them to."

How has your vision changed or come more into focus since becoming superintendent?

"Early on we boiled down the ten page vision that I gave during my interview process to one paragraph."

Vision: "Based on the foundation of forgiveness and connectionalism; the North Michigan Conference is committed to **Developing** pastors and church leadership, **Vitalizing** every church and beginning a church **Planting** movement in Michigan."

"The only thing that has changed in my mind is the size of what God wants to accomplish. Initially, I said if we could get back to 52 churches, which was the size of the conference when I first entered the conference as a lay person, then I would feel like we got done what we needed to do. Now, I can legitimately see our conference doubly in size, but more important than that, I see a conference full of healthy and vital churches! This kind of vision only God can bring about, but it will take our full cooperation."

Is there anything that you just wanted to add?

"I am more hopeful about the growth and health of the conference a year and a half into the job then I was when I started. I am very thankful for the opportunity to be superintendent and . . . I will do all within my ability to live up to the trust given me. . . ."
